Would you support legislation to change the age of a person who can purchase a firearm in Delaware from 18 to 21, similar to HB 330 (during the 149th General Assembly)?	
No	Citizens who are required to serve in the military (should they be drafted) should not be discriminated against.
Would you support “unsafe storage of a firearm” legislation, which would revise the crime of ‘unlawfully permitting a child access to a firearm’ from a class A misdemeanor to a class B misdemeanor, similar to what was laid out in HB 366 (during the 149th General Assembly)?	
No	It makes it impossible to effectively use a firearm for the constitutionally protected right of self-defense.
Would you support efforts to prohibit the manufacture, sale, purchase, transfer, or delivery of large-capacity magazines, as they were defined in HB 375 (during the 149th General Assembly)?	
No	There are millions of these magazines that can't be tracked. A ban will have no effect on criminals.
Would you support efforts to prohibit the manufacture, sale, offer to sell, transfer, purchase, receipt, possession, or transport of assault weapons in Delaware, as they were defined in SB 163 (during the 149th General Assembly)?	
No	They aren't assault weapons, nor anything the military would use.
Would you support efforts to prohibit the manufacture, sale, offer to sell, transfer, purchase, receipt, possession, or transport of silencers (suppressors) in Delaware?	
No	They are silencers. Their purpose is to reduce hearing loss, which is a major issue for older citizens.
Would you oppose Concealed Carry Reciprocity legislation, which would allow anyone who can carry a concealed gun in one state to carry it another?	
No	Inconsistent state laws make criminals out of innocent people. This was understood early in the automobile age when driving laws were made consistent.
Would you support legislation to ban the production, sale, transfer, distribution, possession, and use of 3D printed firearms?	
No	The 3D guns I've seen don't look remotely practical and if they ever become so, a ban will present no barriers to criminals.
